Topic: Employment

Activity: Types of Employment: A Lesson Plan for Use With Refugees From Burma

Objectives

Participants will be able to:

- explain why employment in the United States is important for all employable adults in a family
- √ identify types of jobs and employment which may be available
- ✓ explain employable skills they have and skills required for specific jobs

Lesson Time

60 minutes

Materials

- Refugees from Burma in the United States
 (http://www.cal.org/co/videos/Burmese/Refugees_from_Burma.html)
- Internet access, laptop, projector, and screen, or DVD, television, and DVD player
- Flipchart paper, markers, tape
- Types of Employment: Images Worksheet, 1 per participant (included)
- Writing implements, 1 per participant
- Optional: Types of Employment: Quotes Worksheet, 1 per participant (included)

Introduction

Briefly talk about the importance of employment for employable adults in the United States.

Think-pair-share. Participants spend a minute thinking about the types of jobs they have had in the past. (Remind participants that a mother or housekeeper is a job!) In pairs, participants share one job they have had with their partner.

Bring the large group together and ask for some of the jobs participants have held. Record these on a flipchart.

Viewing Activities

Tell participants the group will now watch a 22-minute video of interviews with refugees from Burma resettled in the United States. Distribute *Types of Employment: Images Worksheets* and writing implements to participants. Tell participants to watch for the images on the worksheet, and check them off when they see them in the video. Ask participants to pay special attention to the different types of employment in the video.


View Refugees from Burma in the United States.

Practice

In small groups, participants discuss the types of employment they saw in the video, and what skills would be needed to perform that job. Encourage participants to refer to the images on their worksheets to remember what happened in the video.

Bring the large group together and ask for highlights from the small group discussions. Record the skills required for some of the jobs in the video on a flipchart. Tell participants that their first job in the United States will probably be an entry-level position.

Think-pair-share. Participants spend a minute thinking about the skills they have. (For example, skills participants have used in previous jobs mentioned earlier in the



session.) In pairs, participants share one employable skill they have with their partner.

Bring the large group together and record some of the employable skills in the room.

Discussion Questions


- Why is employment important in the United States?
- What are some entry-level jobs that could be available to you?
- What are the employable skills you already have?
- How might you learn more employable skills?

Variations

- 1. Discuss other types of entry-level employment positions with participants. Share images of some other entry-level jobs.
- When working with more literate participants, distribute Types of Employment:
 Quotes Worksheet. After viewing the video, participants complete the worksheet
 and discuss their answers in small groups. These quotes can also be utilized
 during the large group discussion to highlight specific employment topics discussed
 in the video.



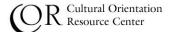












Types of Employment: Quotes Worksheet
